Athletics

- During the spring 2021 term, the average semester GPA for student athletes was 3.190, down from the "P-infused" 3.391 of 2020, but up from the 3.146 earned in spring 2019. The GPA for all women's teams was 3.550, led by cross country at 3.878. The lowest women's team, basketball, still averaged 3.144. Golf set the pace in the men's division with a semester GPA of 3.587. The overall men's average was 2.970.
- 57 athletes (74 in 2020; 48 in 2019) earned a 4.0 GPA during the spring term. 34 were women (softball 7; swimming and track 6). Soccer and swimming (5) led the way for men with football checking in with 4. Currently, 22 athletes, equally divided between men and women, are carrying 4.0 cumulative GPAs.
- 89.9% of women athletes (152 of 169) earned a semester GPA of 3.0 or higher; 56.9% of men did so (173 of 304). Overall, 325 of GWU's 473 athletes achieved this standard (68.7%).

- Gardner-Webb ranked ninth (same as in 2019) in men's sports in the Big South Conference in the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate 2020 report. Golf tied for first place; the next highest ranked team was baseball (3rd). Gardner-Webb's women finished fifth (down from fourth in 2019) despite having four of its seven teams—golf, soccer, tennis and volleyball—finish in a tie for first place. Overall, GWU finished seventh after ranking fifth in 2019 and seventh in 2018).
- In the conference's NCAA Federal Graduation Rates standings, Gardner-Webb's men finished ninth (down from eighth in 2019 and seventh in 2018) while the women placed third (down from second in 2019 but up from fifth in 2018). Baseball was GWU's highest-ranked men's sport (second) while tennis and volleyball set the pace in the women's division with first-place finishes.
- **NOTE:** All freshman women tennis players that entered Gardner-Webb between the years 2001 and 2013 have graduated from the University. The only other NCAA Division I institutions that can claim a 100% graduation rate during this 14-year span are Bucknell, Holy Cross and Notre Dame.
- The following nine Gardner-Webb sports exceeded the NCAA Division I Federal Graduation Rate (FGR) average for their particular sport (GWU value in bold):


- The one-year retention rate for athletes entering GWU in the fall of 2020 was 66.9%, down slightly from the 2019 mark of 67.7% and the lowest percentage in 16 years. Male athletes returned at a rate of 62.2%, up two percentage points from the previous year. Women returned at a rate of 77.6%, down from 2019's 84.3%. Of those teams with at least four first-time athletes, men's and women's basketball, softball and women's swimming realized a one-year, 100% retention rate.
- The six-year graduation rate for athletes was 51.8%, down nearly three percentage points from last year's 54.7% and off 10.7 percentage points from the 2013 cohort's all-time record of 62.5%. The rate for female athletes was 56.9%, down from 60.3% the previous year. The men's rate of 48.1% was also down--by three percentage points from the 2014 cohort and by nearly nine percentage when compared to the 2013 class.

• The average class size for all programs was **12.26**. Broken out by program, along with the department/school with the largest average section size:

 English contributed the highest percentage to the university's core instruction, (15.48%), followed by Religious Studies (15.03%), Social Sciences (14.90%), Mathematics (11.66%), and World Languages (10.71%).




- Business contributed the highest percentage to the University's DCP instruction (26.70%) while Education covered 32.58% of the University's graduate level instruction.
- Five departments contributed over **50%** of their resources to core instruction—World Languages (**60.71%**), Health, Sport and Physical Education (**54.29%**), English (**53.67%**), Mathematics (**52.75%**) and Social Sciences (**51.08%**). At the other end of the scale, Business contributed only **3.21%**.




• 145 North Carolina high schools were represented in the 2020 cohort, up from 139 in 2019 and 130 in 2018. Schools that supplied four or more students to the 2020 FTFT cohort along with their most recent five-year totals:



- With the exception of Kings Mountain and Home School, all schools listed above increased their 2019 GWU cohort contribution.
- The total cohort of **471** was **69 more** than in 2019. It tied the third highest class in GWU's senior college history.
- Males comprised **53.3%** of the cohort—the first time in 28 years that men outnumbered women in the entering freshman class.
- **46.1%** of first-time students were athletes—the highest percentage ever and seven percentage points higher than the 2019 record. **67.7%** of first-time men were athletes, also topping 2019's previous high of **58.7%** by nine percentage points.
- 48.8% of the cohort listed their ethnicity as "White," the lowest all-time percentage. This continued a steep three-year decline (54.2% in 2019; 63.2% in 2018; 69.8% in 2017).
 20.6% identified as "Black", down slightly from last year's record of 21.1%.
 5.7% described themselves as "Hispanic," the highest percentage ever.
- **55.2%** of the cohort were from North Carolina, the lowest percentage ever. South Carolina **(13.8%)** and Florida **(5.3%)** claimed their highest percentage of the entering class in at least the past ten years. Georgia's representation **(6.8%)** was the second highest mark on record for that state.
- 31 states and 50 North Carolina counties were represented in the cohort. 40 students came from Gaston county—the largest contingent from that county in at least 20 years and a 66.7% increase from 2019.
- South Carolina's largest contributing county was York (10).









Comparative

Colored arrows reflect one-year changes in values and rankings. The following definitions will be helpful in understanding various terminology:

Total Cost of Attendance – tuition, fees, room, board, books, incidentals

Real Cost of Attendance - tuition and fees minus institutional aid

Discount Rate – institutional aid divided by tuition and fees

Net Price – total cost of attendance minus all scholarship aid

Admissions Selectivity – number of admitted divided by number of applicants

Admissions Yield – number of enrollees divided by number admitted

"The marketplace for college-ready high school seniors has never been more competitive, especially in North Carolina. Gardner-Webb University has long stood out among its competitors for providing rigorous degree programs within a caring Christian environment. Now, we must also measure up against North Carolina and other southeastern private institutions with respect to such metrics as affordability, selectivity, retention, and graduation rates. The most recent data presented here place GWU within the Top 10 in six categories relative to NCICU peers, and we rank reasonably high in both graduate and transfer enrollment when compared to other private schools in the southeast. That said, I've never met anyone who loudly proclaimed, "We're #29!" At Gardner-Webb we aspire to elevate our rankings, and this Academic Year in Review document provides an essential baseline against which we will measure our progress moving forward."







Faculty

Demographics

- **54.7%** of the 161 members of the full-time teaching faculty are women (the highest percentage in GWU history).
- 46.6% are tenured with another 8.7% on tenure-track. The combined percentage of 55.3% tenured/tenure track faculty continues the linear decline of the past six years (2016 65.1%; 2017 63.9%; 2018 61.0%; 2019 58.5%; 2020 56.8%)
- 39.1% hold the rank of professor while 21.1% are associate professors and 28.0% assistant professors.

Salaries

• The average faculty salary for all ranks increased by **1.56%**. This was the seventh year in the past eight that salaries rose. The one-year average decrease for men (-0.78%) was more than offset by the highest one-year increase for women (**5.13%**) since 2009. The average salary for both professors (-2.59%) and assistant professors (-1.29%) decreased while associate professors (1.56%) and instructors (1.91%) increased. At all ranks, women earned **90.4%** of males, down slightly from the previous year's **90.7%** and 2019's record of **92.4%**. For only the third time in at least the last 16 years, women assistant professors earned more than men. And for only the second time since 2006, women associate professors earned more than men. 

• Gardner-Webb placed 17th among NCICU (n=36) and 103rd among 238 southeastern privates (55th %tile) in average faculty salary for all ranks. By specific rank, GWU's place among NCICU was as follows: Professor (19th); Associate Professor (14th); Assistant Professor (16th); Instructor (14th). The NCICU mean was **63,602** and the median was **59,124**.

Overloads

- Overload pay for all instructors in spring 2021 continued a five-year downward trend, dropping \$49,000 from spring 2020. Pay for FTTF increased by about \$106,000 while outlay to adjuncts decreased by close to \$155,000. 56.3% of all overload pay for FTTF went to support graduate programs. The largest amount of pay for adjuncts was for their instruction in the Traditional Undergraduate Program, but by only \$2,000 more than graduate assignments (\$164,834 to \$162,803).
- Three schools (Education \$266,644; Business \$216,345; Nursing \$210,555) awarded 60.8% of the overload dollars.
- 306 hours of administrative release credit were awarded to FTTF in spring 2021—the equivalent of 25.5 full-time faculty positions. This continues a three-year downward trend (338 in spring 2019; 325 in spring 2020). Five departments / schools received at least 24 hours of release credit—Nursing (48), Education (42), English (36), Physician Assistant Studies (33), Psychology (24). 60 faculty (38.7%) received at least one hour of administrative release.

- **582.64** hours of overload teaching credit were awarded during spring 2021. **98** faculty **(63.3%)** taught at least .33 hours of overload credit. **62** faculty **(40.0%)** earned more than three hours of overload teaching credit. The 18 members of the School of Business faculty combined to accumulate **242.61** hours of overload credit. The School of Education was next with **84** hours, followed by Nursing at **60.89** and Natural Sciences with **50.5**.
- 131 faculty (84.5%) received some form of administrative release or overload teaching credit from the University's total of 888.64.



Grading

- The average TUG program grade awarded by all faculty during the spring 2021 semester was **3.205**, the lowest since spring 2017 and down dramatically from the "P-infused" **3.507** anomaly of spring 2020. Still, it is the third highest "normal" mark on record for any spring term. The average grade awarded in the TUG program by full-time teaching faculty (FTTF) was **3.189** and by part-time/adjunct faculty **3.279**. Excluding last spring, the PT/Adjunct average was that group's lowest mark since spring 2006.
- **55.4%** of all TUG grades were A's—the fifth consecutive spring semester over 50% after never having exceeded that level before spring 2017. A's and B's combined for **79.8%** of all TUG grades despite the fact that the percentage of B's awarded **(24.4%)** was the lowest percentage on record. **5.0%** of all grades were F's—the highest since the spring 2012 semester.
- The average non-traditional undergraduate grade was 3.307—the highest mark ever excluding last spring. 63.1% of all grades were A's. 20.5% were B's (the lowest percentage ever) while the 6.5% of F's handed out was the highest spring percentage in five years. The average graduate-level grade was 3.658 with 79.4% being A's. 0.9% were F's, tied for the lowest percentage of all-time.
- Only one full-time instructor's average TUG grade (Education) was below 2.0 (1.214). 44 faculty awarded average TUG grades of less than 3.0. In spring 2020, no FTTF had a sub-2.0 GPA and only nine awarded average grades of less than 3.0. In the spring 2019 semester, three faculty members' average grade was below 2.0 and 36 were below 3.0. 22 faculty (17 Nursing, 3 Music, 2 Education) with at least four students had a semester TUG GPA of 4.0.

- Gardner-Webb conferred 942 degrees in 2020-21, down 36 degrees from the previous year but six higher that in 2018-19. The University now has awarded 36,090 (1,917 Associates, 23,348 Bachelors, 10,825 Graduate) degrees since becoming a senior college in 1971. In August, the College of Health Sciences awarded its 5,000th degree (Nursing AS 1,828; Nursing Bachelors 1,922; Nursing graduate 875; Physician Assistant Studies 178; Exercise Science 197).






Retention/Graduation Rates

• The University's one-year retention rate for first-time, full-time students (entering fall 2019; returning 2020) was 67.9%, down 5.7 percentage points from the 2018 cohort's mark of 73.6%. It was only the second time in eight years that the first-year retention rate dipped below 70%. The retention rate for men was 65.2%, up one point from the previous year. The women's rate dropped 10.5 percentage points from the 2018 record of 80.7%.



- The one-year retention rate for athletes entering GWU in the fall of 2019 was 66.9%, the lowest mark in 16 years. Male athletes returned at a rate of 62.2%, up slightly from the 61.6% of 2018 (the lowest percentage since 2004). Women returned at a rate of 77.6%--down 6.7 points from 2018 but still significantly higher than 2017 all-time low of 64.9%.
- After two straight years of record-setting retention rates (77.1%, 76.8%), the
 percentage for non-athletes dropped to 68.6%. There was little variation between
 the genders—men 70.0%; women 68.0%.





- The six-year graduation rate for the class entering in 2015 was 46.5%, down eight percentage points from last year and 12.2 points from the 2013 cohort's all-time record of 58.8%. It was the second lowest mark in the past 15 years.
- The six-year graduation rate for athletes was **51.8%**, down from last years' **54.7%** as well as from the all-time record of **62.5%** achieved by the 2013 cohort. It was the third lowest value in the last 13 years. The rate for female athletes was **56.9%**, the first time this value has fallen below 60% in 24 years. The men's rate of **48.1%** was down three percentage points from 2014 and nearly nine points from the 2013 cohort's all-time high of **57.0%**.
- The four-year graduation rate of 50.9% for the 2017 cohort was an all-time record for Gardner-Webb. The women's mark of 54.7% was also the highest in history, while the men's mark of 45.0% was the second highest of all time (45.2%, 2014 cohort). There was a large discrepancy between the graduation rate of female athletes (50.9%, the lowest in ten years) and female non-athletes (56.0%, the highest percentage ever).
