


MISSION

MASTER OF ARTS IN MENTAL HEALTH COUNSELING


The Master of Arts in Mental Health Counseling program develops skilled clinicians and well-educated leaders within a caring and challenging environment. Students will develop academically, professionally, and personally in order to better prepare them for diverse counseling settings.

The program is designed for working adult students who seek advanced educational experiences and clinical training leading to certification and/or licensure for professional positions in the mental health counseling field. Our counseling program prides itself on developing students who will be prepared to take the National Counselor Exam.

Graduate students will experience an advanced curriculum which involves the application of principles in mental health counseling, human development, treatment planning, group dynamics and the assessment of mental illness and dysfunctional behavior.


